

KEIZER - Mary Lynn was born on November 14, 1952, in Yakima, Washington, the daughter of The Reverend Canon Robert L Baxter Jr., and Francis Maura Baxter. Following her father's callings as an Episcopal priest, she and her family moved to Seattle when she was seven and then to Tacoma when she was 13. She graduated from Lakes High School in 1971. She attended Willamette University graduating in 1975 with a degree in Phycology and then spent a year at Western Oregon University (then Oregon College of Education) to earn her teaching certificate.

She began a 30-year career with Salem/Keizer Public Schools as a First-Grade teacher in 1976. She moved to teaching kindergarten in 1985. She touched the lives of hundreds of children in the Salem-Keizer area through her career.

Mary Lynn and John met at Willamette and became good friends. That friendship grew into romance toward the end of her sophomore year culminating in a year of engagement. They were married on May 25, 1974, at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Lakewood, Washington with the marriage service officiated by her father.

Mary Lynn and John lived all their adult lives in the Salem-Keizer area except for two years living in Sherwood during the time John was city manager.

Mary Lynn and John's eldest sons, Erik and Matthew, have disabilities. This became the defining value of Mary Lynn's life, not only being a loving mother, but a strong advocate of her boys and then a huge advocate for other families with children with disabilities. At the time Erik was born, in 1980, there were no therapy providers or organizations in Salem to help. So, Mary Lynn started creating them. She was a founder of Parents of Special Kids, a very active support group, and then the Mid-Valley Children's Guild, a professional therapy clinic for children with disabilities through which hundreds of families found services over the years. She also was very active in many other support activities in the Salem area including leading the Scholastic Book Club service at Family Building Blocks and serving on the Board of Garten Services for many years.

Mary Lynn is survived by her husband, John, and sons Erik, Matthew, and Nicholas of Salem, and Andrew of Glendale, California; Nicholas's wife, Aerial and their new child, Hazel Lynn; and Bev Carlson, John's aunt, who was a very important part of Mary Lynn's life. She also is survived by her brother Bob Baxter of Bellevue, and brother Ed Baxter and sister Elizabeth Lansing of Tacoma.

Perhaps that activity which was most important to her was adaptive skiing. Erik and Matthew have skied for almost 30 years because of adaptive skiing programs in Eugene and later with Oregon Adaptive Sports. John is a ski instructor and always had his volunteer, Mary Lynn, to support him, other instructors, and the athletes. Mary Lynn's role was to help however she could both on the slopes and in the lodge. She was intensely proud of Erik and Matthew's skiing skills, but much credit must go to her role in creating those skills and opportunities.

A memorial service will be held July 11 at 11:00 at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Salem. Yesterday I received a \$2,500 check from the Salem Rotary Foundation for DPIL so we're reading to get this program launched.

International Convention Comments

This convention was a lot more relaxed and informal than ones I've attending before. We had time to enjoy the sights, sample the local foods, try out new drinks and still participate in the whole convention. The two keynote speakers were outstanding! Courtney Clark taught us, when life gives you some major struggles, just take a detour and you can probably come up with a better plan. I've been taking a detour since I've been home since I brought a mild case of Covid back with me.

Ingvi Omarsson, 2018 teacher of the year in Iceland, shared that to be human is to use your whole body and brain. It is not appropriate to take young children and put them in chairs and ask them to sit still. I think I've heard that before!! He feels we need to teach more to the arts to develop complete brain function. According to Ingyi, students learn more by playing cooperatively in groups and not trying to learn by themselves. We need to prepare students for the future and not be stuck on how we learned in the past. We need to have the courage to change.

For my workshops I tried to focus on ones that would help us at the chapter level as we try to rebuild our chapter and meet the needs of our Early Career Educators. Seasoned Educators and Retirees. There is so much we can learn from each other and there are some ways we can all be teachers and learners. I attended two workshops that I feel will help us. One of them was aimed at helping meet the needs of Early Career Educators as they settle into their careers and the other was Supporting Our Sisters or just SOS! SOS was started in Kentucky as counselors became aware of the struggles classroom teachers were having during Covid and wanted to help them. They formed a virtual group where anyone could join from around the state just to discuss what was working well and what they were struggling with. They didn't want classroom teachers feeling alone in their struggles. They continue meeting once a month virtually and the group keeps growing.
