Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

As I shared before, Cindy and I are part of a Steering Committee working with local partners to develop a plan for bringing the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to our area. Lisa Harnisch, Executive Director of the Marion & Polk Early Learning Hub has agreed to have the Hub be the "Local Champion" for the program. That means they have the right non-profit number so they can set up an account and pay the book invoice each month for children we have enrolled in our Imagination Library program. Lisa and I have a Zoom meeting set up on October 5th with the Regional Director for Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to discuss exactly how this comes about. After that meeting, we will have another Steering Committee Meeting to discuss how the partners will work together getting financial sponsors for the program.

In the meantime, I would like all of you to be thinking about who DKG might approach to become a financial partner. I know banks offer grants for community projects. I have checked on line for information on MAPS Community Grants and they are revising their guidelines and will be sharing the new ones after the first of the year. Spirit Mountain has community grants and that might be a possibility, but I know they really support Yamhill County's Imagination Library. There are also car dealerships, Lion Clubs, Rotary Clubs and many other Civic Organizations around. Do you know of anyone who might be a member of an organization or a business that might be supportive? I'm just wanting ideas of who to contact. I don't expect you to go out and solicit.

I see our DKG Chapter helping sign up children for the program during a special family event being held around town (once Covid is under control) and maybe helping keep the data base updated which can be done from home. I'll be learning how to do
