#### **Projects Reviewed**

- **1.** Sunshine Lady: Sue Nelson is doing a wonderful job with sending cards and notifications about members.
- 2. Neonatal Intensive Care Unit Literacy Program: NICU. Kathy Martell and Marie Mueller had collected a group of new books for the program which Kathy presented to Deb Freels, the liaison to Salem Hospital for this project. Salem Health informed us that not only books for newborns (board books), but also "chapter books" are good to donate. The only caveat is that they must be new to avoid germs/viruses. Parents, both moms and dads are asked to hold their child on their chests and read aloud to them. This greatly assists these early-arrivals to become accustomed to the sound of the parents' voices—and gives the parents a positive activity to help their newborns.
- 3. **Mary Lynn Morgan Early-Career Literacy Award:** Shirley Lomax is heading this project, which aims to collect 70 books this year (in honor of Mary Lynn's age at death) to donate to our guest, Ivie Uppinghouse, third grade teacher at Yoshikai Elementary School. (Alyce Yoshikai was a founding member of Alpha Epsilon Chapter, and the school is named in her honor.) Shirley L. is soliciting donations and grant funding to help us and to continue the project in future years. A gift registry is on Amazon / Early Childhood Literacy Award.

Ivie says that almost any age-appropriate book in the range of third grade, plus or minus a few grades, would be welcome. Shirley Lomax provided an informational handout and then recommended resource to access books that reflect consideration of diversity, mental and physical issues that face students— and which could assist students to overcome and adapt to those problems. Members were interested and encouraging.

#### **Actions:**

- Kathy M. will do book labels for both of the above book efforts.
- Bring books for NICU or Ivie Uppinghouse to the November meeting.
- Keep track of who donates the books. Shirley Lomax wants to recognize them.
- 4. **Fall Conference, October 8, 2022, in Jefferson:** Members and guest were urged to attend and to bring friends to this one-day event. General topics, location, and costs were shared in a handout. We hope many members can attend, as this conference is in our backyard, so to speak.
- 5. **ARF Book Sale:** Jennifer Butler Brown will bring books for sale, have more sales online, and is offering a percentage of sales for our 501(c)(3) Foundation. Bring money!
- 6. **Mental Health for Educators: a Crisis** (handout) was distributed. Marie noted that the concept came from the U.S. Forum at International Convention this last summer (July 2022) and that the invitation to the **free** September 23 event is from the Washington State Organization, but is open to all interested educators, members or not, from any state.
- 7. **Early-Career Educators:** Emily Tarbell and Cindy Ryan are working on ways to show the value and benefit of DKG, with hopes of gaining new members who can participate in DKG benefits.
